3MT (3 Minute Thesis)

This is a fun and engaging contest where students rise to the challenge to present their thesis or doctoral research in 3 minutes. Imagine years of work summarized down to a few minutes and understandable to an interdisciplinary audience! Step up and showcase your discoveries!

Eligible graduate students are:

- 1. Completing a thesis or dissertation.
- 2. Planning to complete the Master's or Doctoral degree with that thesis or dissertation by summer 2022.

The time required to compete in the 3MT is time *related* to preparing the justification for and communication of the thesis and dissertation research. Previous competitors have reported that the 3MT work helped their writing and ability to defend orally their work. The 3MT's purpose is also to train students to communicate – quickly but effectively – their work to broader audiences, another key skill.

All competitors who make the finals for November 30 (there is a preliminary competition to narrow down the finals to the top 8) receive significant promotion of their scholarship, ODU news attention (and possibly beyond), and a professional video of their presentation that they can use for CVs, etc. Significant prize money is available.
