This edition of **The Inclusive Voice** newsletter highlights the semester's workshops, virtual cafés, and other events.





From December 3–5, 2024, Virginia Health Sciences' Faculty Affairs and Professional Development, in collaboration with the Division of Academic Affairs, hosted the Centering Mentoring series. Dr. Jenkins participated in this three-day event focused on cultivating mentoring practices and fostering cross-cultural, interdisciplinary, and generational connections.

As the semester progressed, Dr. Jenkins led a workshop on Unconscious Bias, focusing on how implicit beliefs shape perceptions and interactions. Faculty explored ways to recognize and address these biases thoughtfully, fostering collaboration and inclusivity. The session provided participants with practical tools to build awareness and promote equity within our academic community.







We concluded the semester with a Cultural Competency workshop led by both Dr. Steffon Campbell and Dr. Shanda Jenkins. This session emphasized understanding and communication across cultures, equipping faculty with tools to enhance cultural awareness and foster inclusivity. The workshop served as a strong conclusion to our Fall series, reaffirming our commitment to an inclusive academic community.







