

A YEAR OF GROWTH AND SUCCESS

We are thrilled to share the latest updates from the Monarch Internship and Co-Op Office as we celebrate our **one-year anniversary**!

Established on July 1, 2023, our office has made significant strides in supporting Old Dominion University students in securing impactful internships that pave the way for their future professional development. On July 1, 2024, we marked our first anniversary, a testament to our commitment to enhancing student employability through experiential learning. This milestone was closely followed by our celebration of Virginia Intern Day on July 25, where we honored our student interns' hard work and achievements.

SUMMER SUCCESS: \$100,000 INTERNSHIP SUPPORT GRANT

This summer, we were proud to distribute a \$100,000 internship support grant aimed at helping our students overcome financial barriers to success. We are dedicated to ensuring that every ODU student has the resources they need to excel in their internships, regardless of their financial situation. This grant provided essential assistance to summer and fall student interns, covering housing hardships, transportation, materials, and other types of financial support. MONARCH HUMANITIES INTERNSHIP ACADEMY: A SUMMER PILOT

The newly established Monarch Humanities Internship Academy has been hard at work launching a Summer pilot program. This 5-year, \$5,000,000 initiative is designed to help selected Humanities undergraduates engage in meaningful internships, offering them both practical experience and financial support. The Academy's efforts align with our broader goal of ensuring that all ODU students, regardless of their major, have access to high-quality internship opportunities.

LOOKING AHEAD: YEAR TWO AND BEYOND

As we enter our second year of operations, we are more committed than ever to helping ODU students secure life-changing internships. Our focus remains on expanding our support services, forging new employer partnerships, and increasing the number of students who participate in internships. This Fall, we will be announcing initiatives to distribute a \$100,000 data collection grant to make sure every student intern receives internship recognition on their academic transcript through our no cost-zero credit courses, UNIV 68 and GRAD 668 as well as support Blue Table Talk, an engaging student professional development series. We are excited about the future and the positive impact we will continue to have on the lives of our students. Transitions: A New Foundation Exhibition

An art exhibition encompassing the ACT was displayed in the Perry Library Gallery from August 26th to September 20th, 2024.

Professional ceramic students, teachers, and artists from ODU and the Hampton Roads area have united to create a new "foundation" for our community to build on; focusing on spaces and structures that have a positive impact and are geared toward the community and societal issues that are affecting us today in politics, religion, and conservation. The installation represents students from all nationalities, ethnicities, ages, and socioeconomic backgrounds.

COLLABORATIONS

The Office of Study Abroad and Office of Academic Innovation and Learning Support, with the ePortfolio Studio, collaborated in this Study Away Experience, connecting ODU students and faculty with education, culture, and history.

WHAT IS STUDYING AWAY?

The **ODU Center for Global Engagement** defines studying away as "courses that contain a short-term domestic travel component." The purpose is for students to participate in a "high impact practice for the positive effect that participation has on student's engagement, learning, and overall academic success" (Kuh, 2008).







Through Seattle Experience, ODU Students Engage, Inquire and Grow

In the spring semester of 2024, ODU students participated in a faculty-led studying away program to Seattle, Washington, as part of the course, *LGBTQ+ Organizational Culture in the Pacific Northwest*. In this program, Instructors Alison Lietzenmayer, Carla Harrell, and Megan Mize asked students to examine "the ways in which major tech companies, like Amazon and Microsoft, support and celebrate LGBTQIA+ culture and workers within their larger organizational culture."

While in Seattle, students visited the Wing Luke Museum, Pioneer Square Neighborhood, major tech companies, large News Stations, and additional historical sites to research "the ways in which organizational policies and gendered communication in these spaces promote equity and radical inclusivity."

Visiting these places in person gave students a deeper awareness and understanding of LGBTQ+ culture and Pan-Asian Americans and Immigrants' experiences. Afterward, students were asked to collaborate on one ePortfolio to discuss their findings, compile media, and express their observations. The impactful participant testimonials and academic development from this study away experience demonstrate the importance of engaging in "immersive learning experiences" for students and faculty.

TUTORING CENTRAL


ODU has over 12 different tutoring centers across campus supporting hundreds of undergraduate courses and employing dozens of undergraduate peer tutors.

Academic Success Initiatives collaborates with all tutoring centers to discuss, coordinate, and evaluate efforts related to formalized tutoring services for students at Old Dominion University with the common goals of supporting student learning in the classroom, improving students' academic performance in challenging courses, and increasing student retention.

THE WRITING CENTER

The **ODU Writing Center (WC)** provides free individual tutorials to undergraduate and graduate students, working on writing projects for any course; WC tutors are not editors or proofreaders, but they coach and encourage students to achieve independence in the composition and revision of their own work. TOP 5 THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT THE WRITING CENTER



The Writing Center serves students (both undergraduate and graduate students) and faculty working on writing for a variety of purposes. While the majority of writing we collaborate with folks on is for coursework, we also help with writing for other purposes, such as writing for publication, application/scholarship writing, writing for the public, thesis/dissertation writing, and creative writing.



The Writing Center is a collaborative space. In other words, we're here to talk through ideas, help writers find resources, and provide writers with feedback to help them improve as writers. We will even help with sentence level writing concerns like grammar and sentence structure, we just ask writers to actively participate during the session.



We can work with you on your writing at any stage in the process. Even if you don't have anything written yet, we can help you brainstorm and plan out your writing project! A piece of writing doesn't have to be "finished" or "complete" for us to meet with you and provide feedback.



The Writing Center is not just limited to on campus appointments, we also offer in-person, synchronous, and asynchronous online appointment options.



We serve approximately 2,000 students a semester through one-on-one appointments. However, we also offer group appointments for writers collaborating on group projects and classroom workshops upon request.

FALL 2024 HIGHLIGHT

Stephanie Fahey, Interim Director for Engineering Student Success in the Batten College of Engineering and Technology, was awarded a \$3,000 NACADA (the Global Association for Academic Advising) research grant for a proposal entitled **Advisor-Initiated Early Interventions for First Semester Computer Engineering Undergraduate Students**.

The research project focuses on retention for Computer Engineering students and is being conducted in partnership with the Electrical and Computer Engineering department and the ODU student branch of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) organization. The project includes engaging students in programming to enhance their academic skills and anchoring students in the major through early introduction to an engineering activity. This Fall semester that activity includes work with a machine learning kit.

FEATURED SERVICE

The ePortfolio Studio

Located on the first floor of Perry Library, the ePortfolio Studio is a collaborative space where students can meet with ePortfolio assistants to help with various digital assignments.

eP assistants serve as peer mentors trained to support students as they develop ePortfolios for various contexts. Students can ask specific questions or get general feedback on the design, content, or functionality of their ePortfolios. eP assistants help students with:

- working with ePortfolio programs such as Google Drive, Google Sites, Wis, and Wordpress, and/or
- developing multimedia elements for ePortfolios such as images, videos, and audio elements.

Students may schedule appointments with ePortfolio assistants online or by visiting the ePortfolio Studio during normal operating hours.
