The Town Hall will outline the timeline and key signposts for developing the new QEP, which is a core part of ODU's 2023 reaffirmation process.


What is the QEP? Here's how SACSCOC defines it...

- "The Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP) is the component of the reaffirmation process that reflects and affirms the commitment of SACSCOC to enhancing the quality of higher education in the region and to focusing attention on student learning.
- The QEP describes a carefully designed course of action that addresses a well-defined and focused topic or issue related to enhancing student learning and/or student success.
- The QEP's topic should be identified through or in concert with the institution's ongoing integrated institution-wide planning and evaluation process. Hence, the QEP standard (7.2) is closely related to Core Requirement 7.1 (Institutional planning)." (SACSCOC Handbook for Institutions Seeking Reaffirmation 2020, p. 32-33)
- 7.2 "The institution has a Quality Enhancement Plan that (a) has a topic identified through its ongoing, comprehensive planning and evaluation processes; (b) has broad-based support of institutional constituencies; (c) focuses on improving specific student learning outcomes and/or student success; (d) commits resources to initiate, implement, and complete the QEP; and (e) includes a plan to assess achievement. (Quality Enhancement Plan)" (SACSCOC The Principles of Accreditation)

QEP: Improving Disciplinary Writing (IDW)

- Held twenty-three (at least two each term since 2012) five-day workshops in which
 432 full-time (and some part-time) faculty were taught how to integrate "write-to-learn" practices into their upper-division undergraduate (300- and 400-level) courses.
- Since attending the IDW Workshops, these faculty have reached at least
 23,704 students at ODU. Involvement of key faculty throughout the process from planning through implementation
- After forming a partnership in a 2016-2017 IDW Action Project, Jennifer Kidd and Stacie Ringleb received nearly \$3 million in NSF funding to support their project partnering education and engineering students to collaboratively plan and teach engineering lessons to local elementary school students.

Information fluency goes beyond summarizing--it involves synthesizing information in a media-rich, data-driven, global information culture. ODU's QEP includes faculty development initiatives designed to cultivate students' ability to read critically, evaluate information in various formats, and creatively integrate their knowledge into a wide range of contexts.



Students struggle with targeted disinformation campaigns on social media.

Students (and others) don't know how to evaluate all of the information they encounter, especially that on the web. They believe falsehoods because they are provocative and frequently repeated.
